

Civil Society call for action on the Health HLMs

Member States, with the tireless support of partners from public, not-for-profit and private institutions from around the world have worked to create political will and momentum for action to tackle real life or death issues related to Pandemic Preparedness, Prevention and Response (PPPR), Universal Health Coverage (UHC), and the fight against Tuberculosis (TB). With High-level meetings (HLMs) set to take place for each issue this week during the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), we - the undersigned - are deeply concerned about the on-going impasse in the political negotiations.

Political negotiations are always challenging - but, we know that all countries and stakeholders ultimately want the best for their citizens - and for this to be a reality, efforts for health must be prioritised. We call on our governments to lead through demonstrating the political will, ambition and investment to realise the right to health for all. Across all HLMs this week we want to hear our representatives make accurate statements for the public record, specific asks of the wider community, and commitments to ambitious action in the interest of UHC, TB and PPPR.

We also want our governments and mission representatives to stand up and fight for each HLM to approve a concise and action-oriented political declaration. Without new Political Declarations on TB and UHC following in the steps of the 2018 and 2019 declarations respectively, and on PPPR, we will not have updated targets and goals toward which we can aim and hold countries accountable to in the pursuit of meeting the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by 2030. The SDGs are a shared blueprint for peace and prosperity for people and the planet, now and into the future, which must not be compromised.

We can not allow political differences to hinder progress on matters of life and death. We urge member states to put people before politics, prioritise the health of all, and seize this historic opportunity to make a positive and lasting impact on global health. Adopting Political Declarations across all HLMs this week is not just about language that sets targets and baseline levels for ambition. It is about saving lives and promoting quality of life; protecting the economy and fostering social cohesion; and adopting global solutions to global problems.

If meaningful Political Declarations are not secured, we will lack the focus and language on which to base future plans and action at national, regional, and global levels, which will thwart the momentum that has been hard-won by advocates to bring global attention to these issues. In all cases, the morale and commitment of engaged partners will be damaged, and broader multilateral negotiations will be tainted if we do not succeed in adopting all three Political Declarations this week.

We look to Member States to come to an agreement that will allow all the PPPR, UHC and TB Political Declarations to move forward. Global health security requires global health solidarity and people affected by TB and catastrophic costs to accessing care depend on there being ambitious political declarations that include clear targets for health, investments and human rights.
